

QIBING RAPID ASSESSMENT OF ADOLESCENT SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (ASRHR)



JANUARY 2022

This fact sheet is a summary of the findings of the ASRHR Rapid Assessment undertaken in Qibing as part of an eight-country study¹ from November 2019 to December 2020. The research aims to strengthen youth-led and focused efforts to promote ASRHR through gender and youth responsive local governance. Gender Links Lesotho conducted the study in nine Centers of Excellence for Gender in Local Government.² In Qibing, the study covered just one clinic; 60 respondents: 52% young women and 48% young men (see table overleaf). This fact sheet should be read together with the Lesotho and the Southern Africa ASRHR Rapid Assessment research pamphlets. Key findings include:

Accessibility

- Eighty percent of the respondents (80%) reported being within 10 km of a clinic, however, more clinics are needed as it is just one that serves that council.
- The facility opens on both after school hours and weekends, this is amazing as young people will not have to worry about when should they visit facilities.
- About (82%) of respondents said that the clinic had a comfortable waiting and consultation area.
- The facility charges an average fee of M15, 00 for consultation and medication.

Quality of care

- About 100% of respondents said they were treated without third party being present and 75% felt privacy at the facility.
- About 83% of respondents attested that they had confidentiality at the facility.

- Over 78% of young people received appropriate information with only 22% saying health workers spend sufficient time with them.
- Fifty percent of respondents confirmed the availability of peer counsellors.

Sexual and reproductive health services

- Only 28% of respondents requested contraceptives and almost 71% received them; this
 is a good sign of showing the accessibility of
 contraceptives to young women.
- About 23% of young women requested pregnancy tests.
- Over 71% of young women received pregnancy tests and 10% tested positive for pregnancy.
- Only 6% of young women requested pads, none of them received them, this is very disturbing as many young women miss school during their period, and as much as VAT has been removed on pads there many young women who still struggle to access them.
- Almost 76% of young men requested for male circumcision and almost 95% received the appointments.
- Sixty-seven percent of young people requested for HIV test and the 100% received HIV tests, this is very impressive especially now that Lesotho is working tirelessly to make sure that testing sites are accessible.
- Only 2% requested ARVS and over 100% received it, this is very good because ARVs are free in Lesotho and people are encouraged to start them immediately after testing positive for HIV.
