

ANJOZOROBE RAPID ASSESSMENT OF ADOLESCENT SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (ASRHR)



JANUARY 2022

This fact sheet is a summary of the findings of the ASRHR Rapid Assessment conducted in Anjozorobe as part of an eight-country study from November 2019 to December 2020. The research aims to strengthen youth-led and focused efforts to promote ASRHR through gender and youth responsive local governance. Gender Links Madagascar conducted the study in ten Centers of Excellence for Gender in Local Government.² In Anjozorobe, the study covered just one clinic; 219 respondents: 53% young women and 47% young men (see table overleaf). This fact sheet should be read together with the Madagascar and the Southern Africa ASRHR Rapid Assessment research pamphlets. Key findings include:

Accessibility

- Over three quarters (77%) of respondents reported being within 10 km of a clinic.
- Among the ten councils within the study in Madagascar, only Anjozorobe is in difficulty with the after-hours care services with a percentage of less than half (41% after school and 46% at weekends); the clinic primarily tracks office hours.
- The majority (85%) said that the clinic had a comfortable waiting area.
- Over a guarter (29%) of youth paid an average fee of \$1 for ASRHR services.

Quality of care

- Almost all young people were treated with respect (98%) and confidentiality (91%).
- A high proportion (85%) of respondents said both that they met with peer counsellors during their visits and that health workers spent sufficient time with them.
- Eighty-four percent of youths received appropriate information, while 81% confirmed that they were received without a third-party presence.

• Over three quarters (76%) of youths reported having received services privately.

Sexual and reproductive health services

- Only 17%, a small minority sought for contraceptive services. Almost all of those who requested contraceptives (90%) received them. A slight effort still needs to be made to reach 100%, as the provision of contraceptives to young people is essential to ASRHR.
- A very low percentage of young women (15%) requested a pregnancy test and almost three guarter (73%) received it. Four percent of the young women were pregnant at the time of the survey: A high proportion that can be justified through the constraints of young people to contraceptives, owing to various barriers (lack of knowledge and full access to ASRHR included).
- Nineteen percent of the young women requested sanitary pads and two-thirds (67%) of them received: more needs to be done to ensure the provision of free menstrual ware, since it is a way to guarantee menstrual hygiene and health.
- At 16% (very low), overall demand for male circumcision, which has been shown to reduce the spread of HIV and AIDS, all of them received an appointment for the circumcision.
- Over a quarter (27%) of youths requested an HIV test. More than two-thirds (71%) who asked for this test received it.
- Only 12% of respondents requested an STI test and they all received them.
- Six percent of the respondents requested antiretroviral drugs for HIV and AIDS, of which none of them received. Possibly because ARVs are generally accessible in Madagascar at the referral district hospitals.
- Less than half (49% overall) said health workers asked about their mental health. A key concern as ASRHR and mental health are closely linked.
