

MAHAJANGA RAPID ASSESSMENT OF ADOLESCENT SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (ASRHR)

JANUARY 2022

This fact sheet is a summary of the findings of the ASRHR Rapid Assessment conducted in Mahajanga as part of an eight-country study¹ from November 2019 to December 2020. The research aims to strengthen youth-led and focused efforts to promote ASRHR through gender and youth responsive local governance. Gender Links Madagascar conducted the study in ten Centers of Excellence for Gender in Local Government.2 In Mahajanga, the study covered four clinics; 216 respondents: 58% young women and 42% young men (see table overleaf). This fact sheet should be read together with the Madagascar and the Southern Africa ASRHR Rapid Assessment research pamphlets. Key findings include:

Accessibility

- A high proportion (90%) of respondents reported being within 10 km of a clinic.
- Almost all the youths (99%) confirmed that the clinics open after school.
- Similarly, 98% of respondents said that the clinics open at weekends.
- A third (33%) of young people reported that the clinics charge an average amount of \$1. Among the four clinics in the study, CSBII Amborovy is the one that charges \$2.

Quality of care

- Almost all the young people (92%) said they met with peer counsellors during their visits.
- The majority (90%) of respondents were treated with confidentiality.
- A high percentage (88%) of youth responded to being treated with respect. This ranged from 76% in CSBII scolaire Mahabibo to 100% in CSBII Amborovy.
- 85% of respondents indicated that health workers spend sufficient time with them, responses vary between 97% in CSBII Antanimasaja to 55% in CSBII Mahavoky.

- Eighty-four percent of youth confirmed that they were both treated with privacy and given appropriate information.
- Two-thirds (67%) of respondents were treated without their parents' presence.

Sexual and reproductive health services

- Less than two-thirds (61%) of respondents requested contraceptives and almost all of those who requested (97%) received. This is a very encouraging finding, as the provision of contraceptives to young people is key to ASRHR.
- Over half (59%) of young women requested a pregnancy test and almost all (98%) received it. Three percent of the young women were pregnant at the time of the survey.
- Only 19% of young women requested sanitary pads and a large number of them (93%) received it.
- At 36%, overall demand for male circumcision, which has been shown to reduce the spread of HIV and AIDS, 96% of them received an appointment for the circumcision.
- Less than half (43%) of youth requested an HIV test. The two lowest rates of youth requiring an HIV test were at the CSBII Antanimasaja (9%) and at the CSBII Scolaire Mahabibo (21%). However, almost all of those who requested contraceptives (99%) received them.
- Only 37% of respondents requested an STI screening test. The statistics has obviously dropped as no young people in CSBII Antanimasaja requested it. Encouragingly, almost all (95%) of those who asked for STI test obtained it.
- Thirty percent of respondents requested antiretroviral drugs for HIV and AIDS, of whose 62% received. ARVs are generally accessible in Madagascar at the referral district hospitals.
- Over two-thirds (68%) said health workers asked about their mental health. A key progress as ASRHR and mental health are closely linked.
