

MANJAKANDRIANA RAPID ASSESSMENT OF ADOLESCENT SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (ASRHR)



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This fact sheet is a summary of the findings of the ASRHR Rapid Assessment conducted in Manjakandriana as part of an eight-country study¹ from November 2019 to December 2020. The research aims to strengthen youth-led and focused efforts to promote ASRHR through gender and youth responsive local governance. Gender Links Madagascar conducted the study in ten Centers of Excellence for Gender in Local Government.2 In Manjakandriana, the study focused on a clinic (Basic Health Centre II); 211 respondents: 51% young women and 49% young men (see table overleaf). This fact sheet should be read together with the Madagascar and the Southern Africa ASRHR Rapid Assessment research pamphlets. Key findings include:

Accessibility

- Less than half (only 42%) of respondents reported being within 10 km of a clinic.
- More than two-thirds (71%) of youth responded that the clinic is open after school.
- Under two-thirds (64%) of respondents said that the clinics open at weekends.
- A high proportion of respondents (86%), said that the clinic had a comfortable waiting area.
- One-third (33%) of young people paid a fee of \$1 to access ASRHR services.

Quality of care

- A high proportion of young people were treated with respect (87%) and confidentiality (85%).
- The majority (82%) of respondents said they both received appropriate information and that health workers spent enough time with them.
- Eighty-one percent of youth met with peer counsellors during their visits.
- Nearly three-quarters (73%) of young people reported having received services in privacy.
- Sixty percent of young people declared being treated without the presence of a third party.

Sexual and reproductive health services

- Only 12%, a small minority sought for contraceptive services, which places Manjakandriana in the last rank of the councils in the survey in Madagascar. Seventy-two percent of those who requested contraceptives received them. A slight effort still needs to be made to reach 100%, as provision of contraceptives to young people is key to ASRHR.
- Similarly, only 13% of young women requested a pregnancy test and 86% received it. Three percent of the young women were pregnant at the time of the survey: a high proportion which could be explained by the constraints of youth to contraceptives, owing to various barriers (lack of knowledge and fully access to ASRHR included).
- Almost none (1%) of young women requested sanitary pads because they know they have to buy one. However, all of those who requested for sanitary pads obviously received: a very significant indicator for menstrual health management.
- Only 10% of youths requested male circumcision. Of these,70% received an appointment for circumcision. Overall demand for male circumcision is very yet it has been shown to reduce the spread of HIV and AIDS.
- Only 1% of youth requested HIV tests, and all received them. While is ranked Manjakandriana at the bottom among the councils in the survey, the health facility is well geared for HIV testing.
- Similarly, only 2% of respondents requested an STI test and three-quarters (75%) of them received it.
- None of the respondents requested anti-retroviral drugs for HIV and AIDS, possibly because they did not require them.
- Almost two-thirds (64%) of youth indicated that health workers asked about their mental health. A key progress as ASRHR and mental health are closely linked.
