

BEAU BASSIN-ROSE HILL COUNCIL RAPID ASSESSMENT OF ADOLESCENT SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (ASRHR)



JANUARY 2022

This fact sheet is a summary of the findings of the ASRHR Rapid Assessment undertaken in Beau Bassin-Rose Hill as part of an eight-country study¹ from November 2019 to December 2020. The research aims to strengthen youth-led and focused efforts to promote ASRHR through gender and youth responsive local governance. Gender Links Mauritius conducted the study in seven Centers of Excellence for Gender in Local Government.² In Beau Bassin-Rose Hill, the study covered 4 community health centres; 121 respondents: 49% young women, 11% gender nonconforming and 40% young men (see table overleaf). This fact sheet should be read together with the Mauritius and the Southern Africa ASRHR Rapid Assessment research pamphlets. Key findings include:

Accessibility

- Ninety-five percent of respondents reported being within 10 km of a community health centre.
- All of the community health centres are open after school.
- Almost all respondents (98%), except in Trefles (94%), said that the Community Health Centre are open during weekends.
- Almost all respondents (95%) said that the Community Health Centres had a comfortable waiting area.
- None of the community health centres charged fees for their services.

Quality of care

- Twenty-six percent of respondents asserted that peer counsellors were available across the four community health centres.
- Overall, 83% of young people said that they were treated with respect while 93% of respondents said that confidentiality was maintained.
- Ninety-two percent of young people felt respected.

- Overall, only 49% of the youth were treated without a parent being present, but Rose Hill and Coromandel community health centres recorded more than a 50% score.
- The majority (92%) of respondents said that health workers spent sufficient time with them.
- Overall 91% of young people affirmed that they received appropriate information overall.

Sexual and reproductive health services

- Only 3% of young people requested for contraceptives and none received any contraceptives upon request. This relatively low percentage of young people requesting and receiving contraceptives is worrying as access to contraceptives is key to ensure that ASRH is prioritised.
- Overall, only 1% of young women requested a pregnancy test and 100% received it. Yet, 7% of women were pregnant at that time.
- It is to be noted that 40% of pregnant women requested for prevention of mother-to-child transmission (PMTCT).
- At 3%, the overall demand for male circumcision, which has been shown to reduce the spread of HIV and AIDS, is relatively low. Furthermore, none of those who requested male circumcision received an appointment.
- Only 3% of youth requested PREP while 1% requested post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP).
- Overall, 9% requested an HIV test. None of those who asked for this test received it - this represents an issue that needs to be tackled.
- A very low percentage of respondents (18% overall) said health workers asked about their mental health. This is a concern, as ASRHR and mental health are closely linked.
- Thirty-six percent of young people said that a follow-up appointment was set up whilst 37% of young people were referred to a relevant facility.
