SYNOPSIS

As a result of the implementation of the Strengthening Health Education Delivery In Communities (SHEDIC) project by RIGE in Bindura rural from Jan 2023 to Dec 2024 a change of attitude by the male leaders, gate keepers of the community was observed in terms of supporting access to Sexual Reproductive and Health Rights (SRHR) services and products by women. As of January 2023, only 10% of the RIGE programs participants were men, Most men from the rural community thought it was a women centred organisation and hence there was no need to support its programming. The RIGE team used to face backlash as they were implementing women empowerment initiatives because men felt left out and challenged. The SHEDIC project activities which initiated male engagement brought the change we are now talking about. An increased in number of men attending RIGE programs has been noted. Attendance to RIGE programs by men had rose from 10% to 47% by Dec 2024. A number of these men are sharing testimonials on lessons learnt from RIGE under its SHEDIC project.

5. Establish a sustainable community-led SRHR program.
6. Advocate for policy changes supporting SRHR and GBV prevention.

Contribution to change

Strategies which led to the change noted:

1. Partnerships and collaboration with local government and service providers made it easy to get permission to carryout the project and to provide services to the community
2. Use of existing community structures and facilities made it easy to coordinate programs and to obtain free venues for activities.
3. Sensitisation meetings & speak out session helped to sensitise community leaders on the relevance of access to SRHR services and resources by women.
4. Stakeholder engagement helped to identify areas to improve service delivery .
5. Male engagement through men's forums helped to address the backlash that was experienced before when the empowerment programs were only targeting women.
6. Mobile Clinics brought SRHR services and resources to the community.
7. SRHR education – IEC materials assisted to raise awareness on SRHR as human rights

Significance of change

Positive attitudes by male community leaders is a step towards achieving access to Sexual Reproductive and Health Rights services by women. The male leaders will further educate men in their respective communities to support access to SRHR services. RIGE will make follow ups (under its WOSSO advocacy project) within the community and identify male gender champions who will continue educating the general male population within the community to support this cause.

RESULTS

Key results noted were changes in gender attitudes at individual and community level. Male attendance to RIGE programs increased from 10% to 47% as of December 2024. Community leaders could speak strongly around encouraging access to SRHR services within meetings. Attached to this slide is a video taken during a dialogue with male traditional leaders encouraging each other to come up with by laws that protect women.



During the 16 days of activism dialogue with village heads and councillors from ward 10 Bindura rural, one of the village heads reinforced that as a way to curb GBV in their villages, families need to be strengthened to have effective communication that identifies and solves potential GBV cases.

Evidence

One community leaders' representative attended a TV show organised by RIGE as part of the project and encouraged males to support this cause.

CHALLENGES AND LESSONS LEARNT

1. Increased unrealistic demand of SRHR services from the community during and after mobile clinics support which was beyond the organization's capacity. This was overcomed by encouraging community members to visit service providers.
2. Backlash targeted at organization's management team and board members. (Presenter to share personal experiences on stereotype and how it ended in divorce and loosing her job). The team is still working on overcoming this through exposure to safe spaces for women and experience sharing on overcoming backlash.

CHALLENGES AND LESSONS LEARNT

Key lessons

- Community engagement is crucial for sustainability.
- Collaboration among stakeholders enhances positive impact.
- Male engagement in SRHR creates a positive change and is crucial in addressing challenges faced in the community.
- Empowering women and girls reduces vulnerability.

CHALLENGES AND LESSONS LEARNT

- Application of lessons learnt:
 - ❑ Establishment of social media advocacy strategies.
 - ❑ Advocating for policy reforms addressing SRHR issues from community to global level.
 - ❑ Continuous male engagement to champion access to SRHR and to address gender disparities in various sectors.

SUSTAINABILITY AND REPLICATION

How the work will be kept going and cascaded to other organizations.

- i. Continuous collaboration with partners and stakeholders including local authority.
- ii. Engaging with policy makers and influencers.
- iii. Constant use of social media platforms.
- iv. Provision of mentorship programs for community gender champions and other organizations.
- v. Resource mobilization.

NEXT STEPS

- ❑ Strengthen the capacity of gender champions in the community through trainings and exposure to intellectual programs.
- ❑ Engage more men to champion access to SRHR services and gender equality.
- ❑ Keep track of existing gender equality trends within the community and the nation, region as well as the global village at large.

Gender equality is not only a women business. Men and women need to join forces for sustainability.
