

MVURWI TOWN COUNCIL RAPID ASSESSMENT OF ADOLESCENT SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (ASRHR)



JANUARY 2022

This fact sheet is a summary of the findings of the ASRHR Rapid Assessment undertaken in Mvurwi Town Council as part of an eight-country study¹ from November 2019 to December 2020. The research aims to strengthen youth-led and focused efforts to promote ASRHR through gender and youth responsive local governance. Gender Links Zimbabwe conducted the study in thirteen Centers of Excellence for Gender in Local Government.² In Mvurwi, the study covered 2 health centres; 40 respondents: 50% young women and 50% young men (see table overleaf). This fact sheet should be read together with the Zimbabwe and the Southern Africa ASRHR Rapid Assessment research pamphlets. Key findings include:

Accessibility

- Almost all (95%) of the respondents reported being within 10 km of a clinic.
- Responses to whether the clinics open after school were very high at 95%.
- Most respondents (95%), said that clinics open during weekends.
- Almost all (85%) of respondents said that the clinic had a comfortable waiting area.
- The average cost of ASRHR services in Mvurwi is USD\$4.

Quality of care

- Almost all young people (97%) said they were treated with respect. All the young people from Government Health Facility 1 (GHF1) said they were treated with respect, while 97% from Government Facility 2 (GHF2) said the same.
- Ninety-eight percent of young people indicated that there was privacy at the clinic. GHF2 had the least responses at 96%. All young people in Mvurwi were treated with confidentiality.

- Less than two thirds (63%) of respondents said that clinics did not require their parents to be present. GFH1 had the least response rate at 27%.
- Over three quarters (79%) indicated that health workers spent sufficient time with them.
- Almost all respondents (95%) said they received appropriate information with the lowest response rate at GHF2 (92%). This is a clear indication that young people in Mvurwi have sufficient knowledge of ASRHR.

Sexual and reproductive health services

- A quarter of young people (25%) requested contraceptives. Less than three quarters (70%) of those who requested contraceptives received them.
- Less than a third (30%) of young women requested a pregnancy test. GHF2 had the least requests at 17%. Half of those who requested received the service. At the time of the study, 5% of young women were pregnant all from GHF2.
- A quarter of young women requested sanitary pads and less than half (40%) of those who requested received them. Requests for sanitary pads were not met at GFH2.
- Three-quarters of young men requested male circumcision. Male circumcision has been shown to reduce the spread of HIV and AIDS. Less than three quarters (73%) of those who requested the service, received it.
- Over half (58%) of all respondents requested an HIV test. 91% of those who requested the service received it. This is evidence of Zimbabwe's commitment to reducing HIV infections.
- Three-quarters of respondents said health workers asked about their mental health. Health workers are treating mental health issues with areater urgency.
